I want you to write one essay on each dictator. You will all start with Hitler now. When we study Stalin you'll work with him and so on. You will get part of the Friday lessons for this.

The dictators are and hence the essays will be about the policies of:

- Adolf Hitler.
- Josef Stalin.
- Mao Zedong.
- Fidel Castro **or** Juan Perón.
- Benito Mussolini (HL), Vladimir Lenin (HL), Gamal Abdel Nasser , Jomo Kenyatta **or** Sukarno.

The topics you should pick from are (you should only pick one on from these):

A: Topics concerning the rise to power:

1. Analyze the social, political **or** economic conditions that produced the single-party state.
2. Analyze the Dictators aims, ideology and popular support as explanations to their rise to power.

B: Topics concerning the establishment of the single-party state:

1. Analyze the methods, legal and force, used by the dictator to establish his power.
2. Analyze the use of propaganda as a mean of establishing power.
3. Analyze the use of women, youth and religious groups as a mean to establish power.

C: Topics concerning the rule of the single-party state:

1. Analyze the structure and organization of government and administration. Use concept such as efficiency or totalitarianism for your analysis.
2. Analyze the international, economic and social policies of the dictator.
3. Analyze the role of propaganda, media and the arts as a mean to remain in power.
4. Analyze the role of education and policies towards the youth as a mean to remain in power.
5. Analyze the policies towards women as a mean to remain in power.
6. Analyze the treatment of religious groups and minorities as a mean to remain in power.
